

LAND ACKNOWLEDGEMENT

St. Matthew's Episcopal Church sits on the traditional homelands of the people of the Council of Three Fires: the Ojibwe, Potawatomi, and Odawa nations. This land was also a place of travel and trade to many other tribes, including the Menominee, Ho-Chunk, and Miami tribes. These Native Peoples were forced off their lands with the Second Treaty of Prairie du Chien in 1829. After a series of land transfers, St. Matthew's acquired its current site within this territory in 1906. Today, Cook County is home to tens of thousands of Native Americans from many tribes. We acknowledge and respect our Indigenous neighbors, as we strive to be good stewards of this Native land.

RACISM EDUCATION

Why can't we do something about racism? Many of us want to rush out and change the broken racial structures in our country. We are horrified by how people of color are treated, and we feel an urgency to fix it. Before we can act, though, we need to understand how we got to this point. We can't solve a problem we don't truly understand. Some important first steps are to explore and understand:

- 1. How we got to this point as a country (our history)
- 2. How we as white people have benefited at the expense of people of color (our privilege)
- 3. How we have unconsciously absorbed a system that sees white people as superior and people of color as inferior (white supremacy)

Thank you to Charlie for the reminder about these steps, that they are important and necessary work for becoming a welcoming community.

ST. MATTHEW'S BOOK GROUP


Thursday, December 16th, from 7pm to 8:30pm.
